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## New in this Edition

### Association for Industrial Archaeology – Deadline: 31<sup>st</sup> March 2019

Grants up to £20,000 are available for the restoration of important industrial buildings, structures, machinery, vehicles and vessels within the UK. Grants can be made to not-for-profit organisations such as trusts, charities and CICs and are for capital funding only.

Applications will usually relate to a single, tangible structure or artefact and the grant is to be used as partnership funding, the applicant being in the process of or having already raised matching funding from their own resources, fund raising, or other grant award.

Applications should be submitted on no more than 4 sides of A4 paper and cover all the areas outlined in the Guidelines.

The closing date for applications is the 31st March 2019.

### Bailey Thomas Charitable Fund (The) – Deadline: Rolling / 1<sup>st</sup> December 2018

The Baily Thomas Charitable Fund is a registered charity that was established to provide both research and project funding in the area of severe learning difficulties, including autism for both children and adults.

Grants are made to cover capital projects and core costs to include staff costs, general running and office costs at charitable organisations, schools and centres.

Projects funded include:

- Capital works for residential, nursing and respite care, and schools
- Employment schemes including woodwork, crafts, printing and horticulture
- Play schemes and play therapy schemes
- Day and social activities centres including building costs and running costs
- Support for families, including respite schemes
- Independent living schemes
- Support in the community schemes
- Snoezelen rooms.

Applications will only be considered from voluntary organisations that are registered charities or are associated with a registered charity. Schools and Parent Teacher Associations and Industrial & Provident Societies can also apply.

Funding in the past has ranged in value from £250 to £150,000.

The next deadline for applications seeking funding in excess of £10,000 is the 1st December 2018.

Applications for £10,000 and below are considered under the Small Grants procedure and can be submitted at any time.

### Barrow Cadbury Trust – Deadline: Rolling

Not for profit organisations that promote positive interaction between different groups in order to counter xenophobia, racism and Islamophobia can apply for funding through the Barrow Cadbury Trust's Migration Programme.

Through its Migration Programme the Trust want to fund grassroots groups working with refugees, asylum seekers, undocumented migrants and other marginalised migrants. The Trust seek to enable grassroots groups to support the most vulnerable migrants as well as empower migrants and ensure they are not excluded from the public debate on migration. Organisations may apply for this programme from anywhere in the UK but most awards will be made in the West Midlands.

No minimum or maximum grant amount is specified.

Applications can be submitted at any time.

## ChurchCare – Deadline: 28<sup>th</sup> January 2019

The Church of England has announced that the next deadline for applications to its ChurchCare - Grants for Fabric Repairs is the 28th January 2019.

ChurchCare supports all those in parishes, dioceses and cathedrals caring for their buildings. The Fabric Repairs programme helps PCCs with the eligible costs of essential fabric repairs in architecturally or historically significant Anglican churches in England, Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland. Applications are considered on the grounds of the historic and architectural significance of the building and also on a parish's engagement with the history and interpretation of the site/building.

Works eligible for funding tend to be Category A or B recommendations in a quinquennial inspection report and include things such as:

- Roof repairs
- Masonry repairs
- Rainwater disposal and drainage.

## Concertina – Deadline: 30<sup>th</sup> April 2019

Charitable organisations and care homes for the elderly can apply for grants of up to £250 for activities which provide musical entertainment and related activities for the elderly. Some of the charities that have received grants in the past include the Theatre Chipping Norton to help fund high calibre music recitals in six Care Homes in the area; and Sue Ryder Care, Lancashire to fund access to music therapy workshops at Birchley Hall near Wigan and St Helen's. The grants are made available through the charity Concertina and the next closing date for applications is the 30th April 2019.

## Gov.uk – Immigration Status Funding – Opens end of November 2018

A new £9 million fund has been announced to support EU citizens who might need additional help when applying for their immigration status through the EU Settlement Scheme. The grant will help voluntary and community organisations to both inform vulnerable individuals about the need to apply for settled status and support them to complete their applications to protect their status as the UK exits the EU. Organisations working with people who might be affected and require additional support can apply for project funding from the Home Office from the end of November.

## Henry Smith Charity – Deadline: Rolling

The Henry Smith Charity provides grants of between £20,000 and £60,000 per year for up to three years to charitable organisations (charities and not-for-profit organisations, including social enterprises) that help people when other sources of support have failed, are inappropriate, or are simply not available.

The charity has six funding priorities that describe the work they support and how they want to bring about change for the most disadvantaged people in the greatest need. These are:

- **Help at a critical moment** - Helping people to rebuild their lives following a crisis, critical moment, trauma or abuse.
- **Positive choices** - Helping people, whose actions or behaviours have led to negative consequences for themselves and others, to make positive choices.
- **Accommodation / housing support** - Enabling people to work towards or maintain accommodation.
- **Employment and training** - Supporting people to move towards or gain employment.

- **Financial inclusion, rights and entitlements** - Supporting people to overcome their financial problems and ensure that they are able to claim their rights and entitlements.
- **Support networks and family** - Working with people to develop improved support networks and family relationships

Grants can cover running costs, salaries and project costs for organisations that can demonstrate a track record of success and evidence the effectiveness of their work. Eligible organisations include charities and not-for-profit organisations (including social enterprises) in the UK with a turnover of £50,000 - £2million (in exceptional circumstances up to £5million).

Applications can be submitted at any time and decisions are usually made within 6 months.

### **Hilden Charitable Fund – Deadline: 19<sup>th</sup> December 2018**

The next closing date for applications to the Hilden Charitable Fund is the 19th December 2018.

Within the UK, the Hilden Charitable Fund makes grants to projects that address disadvantage and by supporting causes that are less popular. In particular, the Fund wants to support projects that:

- Address homelessness
- Support asylum seekers and refugees
- Support community-based initiatives for disadvantaged young people 16 – 25
- Penal affairs.

The average grant awarded is £5,000 and preference is given to supporting small community organisations with an income of less than £500,000 per year. The Trust will consider funding project as well as core running costs of organisations.

### **Kelly Family Charitable Trust – Deadline: 1<sup>st</sup> March 2019**

Registered charities whose activities support and encourage the family to work as a cohesive unit in tackling problems that face one or more of its members can apply for grants of between £1,000 and £5,000 through the Kelly Family Charitable Trust.

The fund also welcomes applications from sports and health-related charities whose activities comply with the above criteria. The Trust will consider both capital and revenue grants. The Trust is happy to support requests for core funding as well as project-based grants, and actively encourages applications from relatively new organisations to help them become established.

**The three areas of activity that the charity wishes to support are:**

- Interventions that support families and help them in ways that prevent the fracture of the family unit, e.g. practical family support, relationship counselling, mediation.
- Families where sexual abuse, physical abuse, domestic violence, alcohol abuse and drug abuse threaten the integrity of the family unit.
- Prisoners and in particular their families, during and after the period of imprisonment

The trust prefers to support charities whose income is below £500,000. However, larger charities with pioneering pilot projects will be considered.

The closing date for applications is the 1st March 2019.

### **Leathersellers' Company Charitable Fund (The) – Deadline: Rolling**

In 2016/17, The Leathersellers' Company Charitable Fund awarded a total of £2 million to UK registered Charities and Educational Institutions. Whilst Greater London projects are prioritised, the trustees are also keen to fund projects around the UK that provide support for children/young people, elderly/old people and people with disabilities through two grant giving programmes:

**The Small Grant Programme** is a fast track grant assessment for one-off grants of up to £3,000 (with the average between £500 £1,500), applicants to this programme can expect a result within six weeks of making an application. **The Main Grants Programme** awards single and multiple year grants (up to four years) of £5,000 and usually up to £40,000 with a successful application taking up to nine months to achieve.

Generally, grants are awarded for special projects, capital grants and core costs such as salaries, rent and utilities. Applications are particularly welcome that support the use of leather within the fashion industry, education in leather technology and the leather trade.

The Leathersellers' Company Charitable Fund also provides Student Grants of up to £4,000 a year for those wishing to study for a full-time Degree at any UK University. Application is via the on-line form only which is quick and easy to use. Applications for the academic year 2018/19 will open May 2018.

### **Masonic Charitable Foundation – Deadline: 2<sup>nd</sup> January 2019**

Local and national charities in England and Wales can apply to the Later Life Grant programme run by the Masonic Charitable Foundation. The Later Life Grant programme is open to charities working to reduce loneliness and isolation of vulnerable and disadvantaged people over 50.

Grants can be offered to charities that provide:

- Mental and physical health support
- Gateway and access to service, e.g. transport and technology
- Community based approaches, i.e. volunteering, positive ageing and neighbourhood support
- Advocacy, social and welfare support

The type of activities that could be funded include:

- Support for emotional and psychological planning for later life
- Digital inclusion sessions to enable older people to access services
- Activities and clubs enabling older people to remain active and make friends
- Providing companionship and befriending schemes for periods of transition
- Advice and information on options for those with health conditions
- Carers and respite support

The programme offers both small grants of up to £15,000 to charities with an annual income of up to £500,000 for projects lasting up to three years; and grants of between £10,000 and £150,000 to charities with an annual income of above £500,000 for projects lasting up to three years.

The closing date for applications is the 26th October 2018 for the small grants programme and 5pm on the 2nd January 2019 for stage 1 application to the large grants programme.

### **Noel Buxton Trust – Deadline: Rolling**

The Noel Buxton Trust supports voluntary and community based organisations in Great Britain and in some of the most vulnerable parts of Africa. The Trust operates three funding programmes:

- **Africa Grants:** Supports projects based in Ethiopia, Kenya, Somalia, Uganda, Sudan and South Sudan put forward by small charities. Within these areas, priority will be given to work with communities living in urban slums and semi-arid regions where economic hardship is most extreme. Grants of up to £5,000 over three years are made to projects that focus on economic development i.e. small business support and training, and microfinance in both urban and rural settings; building sustainable futures in the semi-arid areas of Africa; and support for and protection of street children that helps them find safe and sustainable livelihoods.
- **Families and domestic abuse:** The Trustees particularly acknowledge that there is a pervasive impact on children, and one that can affect them into adulthood and thus consider projects that work with survivors and/or perpetrators of domestic abuse. Grants of up to £5,000 over three years are offered to smaller, grass-roots organisations in England, Scotland and Wales with an emphasis on areas outside London, South-East England.

- **Penal Grants:** Recognising the variety of Voluntary and Community Sector organisations working with offenders, grants are made to local campaigning organisations; self-help groups; and service providers as follows:

One off grants of up to £3,000 to pay for specific projects that help maintain relationships between prisoners and their families or for work that supports the contributions that volunteers make within the prison community.

Grants of up to £4,000 per year over two to three years, particularly where a guaranteed on-going contribution is going to make a difference to the sustainability of a programme or activity.

### Ragdoll Foundation – Deadline: Rolling

Not-for-profit organisations in the UK that are working with children and young people using the arts and creative media can apply for funding through the Ragdoll Foundation's Open Grants Programme. The Foundation's vision is to support projects where the concerns of childhood can be heard. A variety of art forms can be supported including dance, drama, ceramics, creative play, film, music, puppetry and storytelling. Supported projects will support equality of opportunity, can include families and take place in rural or urban settings and may be delivered, for example, in children's and community centres, nurseries, schools and hospitals.

Organisations can apply for both one-off short-term projects and for projects lasting up to three years. Preference will be given to those projects which have a deep commitment to listening to children and allow the perceptions and feelings of children themselves to be better understood. The Foundation is mainly interested in applications that involve children during their early years, but appropriate projects for older children (up to 18 years) will also be considered.

Whilst the Foundation will fund work in and around London, they will prioritise projects taking place elsewhere in the UK.

Grants of up to £50,000 are available with £7,500 generally the smallest.

Applications are accepted on a rolling basis.

### Rank Foundation (The) – Pebble Grants – Deadline: see website

UK registered charities and recognised churches which are raising money for capital projects (building work, refurbishment or the purchase of long-term equipment) or a one-off short term activity (such as an annual respite break or holiday for disadvantaged young people) can apply for funding through the Rank Foundation – Pebble Grants programme. To be eligible to apply the total project cost must be less than £1 million, the organisation must have an annual income of less than £500,000 and the organisation applying must already have raised a third of the total costs. Applications can be submitted at any time and the Foundation is currently accepting applications for the January 2019 meeting of Trustees.

### Rosa UK – Deadline: 14<sup>th</sup> December 2018

Women's organisations can apply for grants for projects lasting up to three years that aim to stop sexual harassment and abuse of women at work and within their communities.

The type of projects that will be supported will include:

- Prevention work (including education and other initiatives)
- Awareness-raising activities
- Grass-roots activism
- Influencing
- Work with groups and communities who might face additional barriers to getting their voices heard, or might be at higher risk of sexual harassment and abuse, to amplify those voices
- Work that tries out new ideas
- Innovative uses of tech/arts/sports/etc
- Work that replicates tried and tested approaches in new settings



- Work that others can learn from

The funding is being made available through the Justice and Equality Fund: Now's the Time Large Grants Programme. Grants of £25,000 – £100,000 are available. The fund is being administered by Rosa the UK Fund for Women and Girls.

Women's organisations applying need to apply in partnership with at least one other organisation.

The closing date for applications is 5pm on the 14th December 2018.

### Variety – Deadline: Rolling

Variety, the Children's Charity, has grants of £250 to £600 available to youth organisations that are affiliated to either Ambition, UK Youth or the National Association of Boys and Girls Clubs. The grants can be used to buy equipment to provide challenging activities that engage young people aged 8-18 and provide them with alternatives to becoming involved in the anti-social behaviour that often stems from boredom and peer pressure. On occasion, applications for improvement of youth club premises, refurbishment of existing equipment or facilities will also be considered.

Applicants have to raise some of the funds and applications that have young people involved in the fund raising will be looked upon favourably. Applications are accepted on a rolling basis.

### Weavers' Company (The) – Deadline: 30<sup>th</sup> November 2018

The Weavers' Company, a textile-related, charitable and sociable organisation, has announced that the next closing date for its grants programme is the 30th November 2018.

Small registered charities can apply for grants of up to £15,000 for projects working with:

- Young offenders;
- Prisoners and ex-prisoners;
- Young disadvantaged people at risk of criminal involvement.

To be eligible for funding, local organisations such as those working in a village, estate or small town should normally have an income of less than £100,000. Those working across the UK or in larger areas should normally have an income of not more than £250,000. Grants are usually given for one year.

Applicants must show that they have investigated other sources of funding and made plans for the future, which should include replacement funding if appropriate.

The closing date for applications is the 30th November 2018.

## FUNDING FOR SCHOOLS:

### Goldsmiths Company (The) – Deadline: 30<sup>th</sup> November 2018

The Goldsmiths Company offers Teachers and Head Teachers with a minimum of 5 years' practical school teaching experience the opportunity to apply for grants of up to £3,000 to enhance their personal and professional development. The offer includes an additional maximum payment of £2,000 to fund supply cover to the school.

Grants offer teachers the opportunity to take time out from the classroom to undertake an original project in the UK or abroad.

Grants can cover the costs such as travel, accommodation and materials. Examples of projects that may be supported include:

- Comparisons of best practice in teaching and school administration at home or abroad
- Personal development projects e.g. creative writing, arts, science, music, languages and coaching.

Applications are assessed on their potential to enhance a teacher's professional life and benefit his/her students on completion.

Applications must be submitted by 30 November 2018.

### Heritage Lottery – Deadline: Rolling (to 2019)

Schools that wish to develop projects that improve the understanding of World War I can apply for grants of between £3,000 and £10,000 through the Heritage Lottery Fund's (HLF) new £6 million small grants programme "First World War: then and now". The aim of this new grants programme is to help communities mark the Centenary of the First World War.

The programme will award £1 million per year for six years. HLF want to fund projects which enable communities to understand more about the heritage of the First World War. In particular, HLF would like to help young people aged 11–25 to take an active part in the Centenary commemorations.

Focusing on the identification, recording and preservation of local heritage; the creation of community archives or collections; exhibitions, trails, smartphone apps and creative material such as plays and music based on heritage sources, the idea is to create an enduring cultural and educational legacy for communities.

First World War: then and now is a rolling programme, and applications can be submitted at any time until 2019.

### Learning Through Landscapes – Deadline: 30<sup>th</sup> November 2018

Learning through Landscapes has announced that the next deadline for schools to apply to the Local School Nature Grant Scheme is the 30<sup>th</sup> November 2018. The scheme offers schools the opportunity to apply for up to £500 worth of equipment from the product catalogue on the Learning through Landscapes website to help schools undertake environmental improvements.

The scheme is only open to schools; learners must be aged 5 and upwards. Successful applicants will have demonstrated that they are passionate about making environmental improvements and, ideally, will have included the children and their local community in decision making about the project and the choice of equipment. All schools in England, Scotland and Wales have a list of 72 products to choose from; the list includes items such as bird boxes, bee hotels and den making kits. Awards include a two-hour training session to help schools get the most out of the equipment provided.

Applicants must be employed by the school. We are unable to accept applications on behalf of the school from PTAs, Governors, 'Friends of' groups etc.

### Paul Hamlyn Foundation – Deadline: 5<sup>th</sup> December 2018

Primary school teachers and school leaders working in partnership with other primary schools as well as arts / cultural organisations can apply for grants to develop the necessary skills, knowledge and confidence to support the delivery of effective arts-based teaching and learning opportunities in the classroom, and to embed learning through the arts in the curriculum.

Applications should focus on:

- Primary schools
- Supporting children and young people experiencing disadvantage
- Approaches which involve learning through the arts
- Long-term, inquiry-based projects which support teachers' professional development and learning
- Promoting effective and equitable partnerships between schools and arts/cultural organisations and artist practitioners

- The contributions of school leaders and artist practitioners as both professional learners and as supporters of embedding learning through the arts in the curriculum
- Approaches which involve any of the following art forms: crafts; creative writing, including poetry; dance; design; film; music; opera; photography; digital arts and media; theatre and drama; the visual arts; and cross-arts practices.

The funding is being made available through the Paul Hamlyn Foundation's Teacher Development Fund. The Foundation expect to make around five grants of up to £150,000 to partnerships of arts/cultural organisations and up to ten schools, who will work together for two academic years.

The closing date for applications is 12 pm on the 5th December 2018.

## Santander Community Plus Fund – Deadline: Rolling

### Sobell Foundation (The) – Deadline: Rolling

The Sobell Foundation was established by the late Sir Michael Sobell in 1977 for general charitable purposes and is a grant-making trust with which he was actively involved until shortly before his death in 1993. The deed of charitable trust, under which the Sobell Foundation was formed, is not specific about the objects of the Trust and allows the Trustees absolute discretion to apply funds for general charitable purposes.

We are not involved in fund raising and rely upon income from our investments to make grants. Grants tend to be made in line with the founder's interests which are principally causes benefiting children, the sick, elderly, needy and disabled. The Trustees aim to achieve a reasonable spread between Jewish charities (operating principally in the U.K. and Israel) and non-Jewish charities operating in the UK.

We will only consider applications from charities registered with the Charity Commission, or charities that hold a Certificate of Exemption from the Inland Revenue. Overseas applicants must supply the details of a UK registered charity through which grants can be channelled on their behalf.

We concentrate our funding on small national or local charities; the trustees are unlikely to support large national charities which enjoy wide support. We do not accept applications from individuals.

### Sport England – Deadline: Rolling

Formally constituted not-for-profit organisations and statutory bodies such as schools, sports clubs, voluntary organisations, local authorities, and governing bodies of sport can apply for grants of between £300 and £10,000 through the Sport England Small Grants Programme.

The aim of the fund is to deliver new community projects to either grow or sustain participation in sport or to support talent development. Priority will be given to projects that increase the number of adults participating in moderate intensity sports; and projects seeking to reduce the drop off rates for 16-19 year olds.

Applications can be submitted at any time and decisions are usually made within ten weeks.

### Sport England (Community Asset Fund) – Deadline: Rolling

Sport England has launched its new capital fund, the Community Asset Fund, in support of its new strategy 'Towards an Active Nation'.

Community organisations, clubs, statutory bodies and educational establishments can apply for investments of up to £150,000 for projects which create or improve opportunities to play sport and get active in local communities.

Grants do not have to be used for a traditional space or traditional sport. Examples of eligible project locations include: canal towpaths, woodlands and open spaces with the potential to be used and enjoyed as part of an active lifestyle.

There are three levels of grant investment:

- **Small Scale Investments** (£1,000 and £15,000) – to cover the cost of emergency works due to something like storm or flood damage, or something totally unexpected that is stopping people from being able to stay active right now.

- **Medium Scale Investments** (£15,000 and 50,000) – to make more substantial changes. This might be an upgrade to an existing facility or developing a new space in the community.
- **Large Scale Investments** (£50,000 and £150,000) – for projects which can demonstrate a considerable impact or are targeting under-represented groups.

**Applications will be accepted at any time. Applicants should apply when their project or idea is ready.**

### Tesco 'Bags of Help' Grant – Deadline: Rolling

Bags of Help is Tesco's local community grant scheme where the money raised from the 5p bag charge in Tesco stores is being used to fund thousands of community projects across the UK (but not Northern Ireland). The projects must meet the criteria of bringing benefits to the community.

Bags of Help is now always open for applications from charities and community organisations. Applications are assessed by Groundwork to ensure they are eligible. In areas where application numbers are high, Tesco colleagues will shortlist the projects to determine which go forward to the customer vote. Three community projects in each local area will be voted on by customers in Tesco stores throughout the UK, with projects changing every other month. Following the vote, the project that received the most votes in its area will receive a grant of up to £4,000, second place receiving up to £2,000 and third place up to £1,000.

To be eligible the charity accounts must have unrestricted net assets of not more than £200,000 or of less than one year's income.

Trusthouse gives grants for running costs or one-off capital costs to charities and not-for-profit organisations in accordance with criteria that are regularly reviewed and decided by the Trustees.

We will accept applications from local or national charities or not-for-profit organisations which are working with residents of urban areas (i.e. more than 10,000 inhabitants) which are classified in the latest government Indices of Multiple Deprivation as being in the most deprived 20%. Applicants must clearly show in their application how their project fits into one or both of these categories.

Within these overarching themes, we are interested in three areas:

## Funding for Schools

### Ashden Trust – Deadline: rolling

The LESS CO2 sustainable schools programme is a free energy efficiency programme available to any UK school including council run, academy or independent schools.

Funded via the Ashden Trust, the programme consists of a series of half day workshops spread through the year, peer mentoring, expert advice and resources. Through participation in the programme, staff are empowered and equipped to make changes and improvements to their school to reduce their energy usage, save money on bills and lower their CO2 emissions. Schools work together, learning from each other in clusters of 15 schools in a suitable geographical area, attending four local workshops throughout a year. The workshops teach the school's representatives about energy saving in their buildings, how to engage with their fellow staff and students about energy, and educate them about the link between sustainability, energy use and efficiency. So far, 269 schools have benefitted from the scheme with those taking part saving on average £2,600 (and 10 tonnes of carbon) in their first year.

Every school in the UK is eligible to apply by registering an interest on the LESS CO2 website at any time.
