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## New in this Edition

### Armed Forces Covenant Fund Trust – Deadline: 11<sup>th</sup> March 2019

A £3 million funding programme to fund renovations and improvements to veterans' community centres has been launched by the Armed Forces Covenant Fund Trust.

Grants of up to £30,000 are available to fund renovations, refurbishments and improvements to existing community centres being used by veterans. A small number of grants of up to £150,000 will be made to more complex projects. Eligible organisations will be Charities or Community Interest Companies supporting the armed forces community that own or have a long lease on an existing community centre used by veterans that is in need of renovation, refurbishment or improvement.

There will be three rounds of funding; and applications for the first round need to be received by 11th March 2019.

### BBC Children in Need – Main Grants – Deadline: 19<sup>th</sup> May 2019

Grants of over £10,000 per project are available through the BBC Children in Need Main Grants programme to not for profit organisations and schools that work with young people who are experiencing disadvantage through illness, distress, abuse or neglect; any kind of disability; behavioural or psychological difficulties; and / or living in poverty or situations of deprivation.

Applications should demonstrate how your project will change the lives of children for the better.

Grants of over £10,000 are available with no upper limit stated, however BBC Children in Need make very few grants over £120,000.

Organisations eligible to apply will be not for profit i.e. schools; registered charities; voluntary organisations; churches; and community groups, etc. In the case of schools, this must not be for work that they have a duty to fund. The Fund is open to applications all year round, but there are a number of deadline and award dates throughout the year. The next deadline is 11:59pm on the 19th May 2019.

### BlueSpark Foundation – Deadline: Rolling

Schools, colleges and community groups in England can apply for grants to BlueSpark Foundation to support the education and development of children and young people through educational, cultural, sporting and other projects. BlueSpark is particularly keen to support projects that will help enhance the self-confidence, team working skills and future employability of children and young people. In most cases, grants will be made on a relatively small scale. Many grants will be under £2,000, most will be under £5,000 and only in a few cases will grants exceed £10,000. Funding provided by BlueSpark for a project must be crucial to the project rather than marginally incremental to its funding. The funding available can be for physical assets (such as iPads, sports equipment, or lighting for stage productions) or for services or facilities (such as sports coaching or music or drama tuition) or simply for the provision of experiences (such as theatre visits). These examples are intended to be illustrative and not restrictive as to the funding that BlueSpark may provide to support projects.

Applications can be submitted at any time and must be made online on BlueSpark Foundation's standard Application Form.

### British Ecological Society – Deadline: 20<sup>th</sup> March 2019

The British Ecological Society has announced that its Outreach Grants programme is now open for applications. Through the programme, individuals and organisations such as schools, museums, libraries and community groups will be able to apply for grants to promote ecological science to a wide audience.

The funding is available for projects that increase public understanding of, and engagement with ecology by:

- Increasing public understanding of, and engagement with, ecology
- Stimulating discussion about ecology and its implications for society

- Inspiring and enthusing people of all ages about the science of ecology, especially those not previously interested
- Developing skills in communicating the science of ecology

Applications from museums and schools are welcome but projects must involve significant outreach beyond schools, as those aimed solely at delivering curriculum to schoolchildren will not be considered. Grants are not awarded for purely nature conservation purposes or any activity that does not promote the science of ecology. Projects supported will:

- Be aimed at a non-academic audience
- Provide a clear demonstration of direct interaction with the audience
- Show evidence of links to the research community at UK, regional and international levels, where appropriate

The maximum award is £2,000, which may form all or part of the total costs of the project. Larger projects involving other sponsors are also funded. In 2017, 14 grants were awarded from a total of 112 entries, therefore potential applicants are advised to take note of the Scoring Criteria to make sure that their project is in line with the expectations of the BES assessors.

The closing date for applications is the 20th March 2019.

### British & Foreign Schools Society – Deadline: 8<sup>th</sup> April 2019

Grants are available to support schools and registered charities that wish to undertake educational work with children and young people in disadvantaged areas.

The British & Foreign Schools Society (BFSS) normally makes grants for educational projects totaling about £600,000 in any one year. The majority (85% of grants) are made to charities and educational bodies (with charitable status). Schools wishing to apply need to have either charitable status or "exempt charity" status.

The Society also offers a small number of grants for organisations and individuals through its [Subsidiary Trusts](#). Eligibility criteria depend on area of residence and/or particular field of educational activity.

### Bruce Wake Charitable Trust (The) – Deadline: Quarterly

The Bruce Wake Charitable Trust will consider grant applications relating to the provision of leisure activities for people with physical disabilities. The Trust was established to encourage and assist the provision of leisure activities for the disabled.

The Trustees particularly favour applications where the potential beneficiaries meet one or all of the following criteria:

- The potential beneficiaries are physically disabled wheelchair users
- Improved access for wheelchair users is proposed
- A sporting or leisure activity involving disabled wheelchair users is proposed

One donation in any 12-month period may be made to charitable organisations.

All applications should be submitted together with appropriate financial information. Charitable organisations should include a copy of their latest financial statements. Applications meeting the above criteria will be considered from charitable organisations. Applications on behalf of individuals will only be accepted through a charitable organisation or equivalent recognised body.

Trustees meet quarterly to consider grant applications.

### Comic Relief / Paul Hamlyn Foundation – Deadline: 25<sup>th</sup> March 2019

After two successful co-funded rounds, Comic Relief and the Paul Hamlyn Foundation (PHF) have extended their commitment to the Tech for Good funding programme. The first UK Tech for Good funding programme of this 3-year partnership is worth a total of £2.4 million. The programme was developed in response to the emerging need for

charities to use technology to explore different approaches to delivering better services. The aim is to support charities in tackling the biggest social challenges enabling them to increase the range of digital products and services available to their beneficiaries in an increasingly digital world.

Tech for Good aims to help 13 not-for-profit organisations to develop their digital products or services. Projects should address one of four core issue areas:

- Children Survive and Thrive
- Global Mental Health Matters
- Fighting for Gender Justice
- A Safe Place to Be.

For this initiative, Comic Relief would also welcome applications addressing challenges related to disability and inclusion outside of the themes specified above, recognising the critical potential of digital technology in tackling these issues.

Successful organisations will receive funding of up to £48,000 for nine months alongside access to dedicated technical expertise and an intensive support programme between July 2018 and March 2019. This will include a residential camp at the start to connect the funded projects with leading tech for good experts, and ongoing mentoring and report back days. A public 'wrap-up' event at the end of the funding will allow the projects to show what they have created with the grant and support.

Tech for Good will be open to applications from February 11th to March 25th 2019.

### Curiosity Fund (The) – Deadline: 12<sup>th</sup> April 2019

Applications are currently being invited for the second and final round of the Curiosity scheme. The £2.5 million Curiosity Fund is provided in partnership between BBC Children in Need and the Wellcome Trust and aims to use the power of science activities to create change for children and young people experiencing disadvantage in the UK. The Fund is not about formal education. Projects should encourage young people to be curious about the world around them and inside them, making a positive difference in their lives:

- building confidence and self-esteem,
- developing life skills and expanding horizons.

Round 2 is making two levels of grants available:

- Small grants of up to £10,000 per year (for up to three years);
- Large grants of up to £40,000 each year (for up to three years).

The Fund is open to applications from not-for-profit organisations with a track record of working with disadvantaged children and young people up to 18 years old and living in the UK. BBC Children in Need expect to make no more than 35 small awards, and no more than 15 large awards in total in this final round.

The closing date for applications is midnight on the 12th April 2019.

### Dan Maskell Tennis Trust – Deadline: 15<sup>th</sup> March 2019

The Dan Maskell Tennis Trust has announced that the next closing date for applications the 15th March 2019.

Individuals can apply for grants of up to £500 for support for sports wheelchairs, tennis rackets, coaching lessons with a Lawn Tennis Association (LTA) licensed coach or course fees for official LTA development/coaching courses.

Groups can apply for: Wheelchairs; Court hire; Coaching fees; and equipment packages which will include:

- Rackets
- Balls
- Mini net
- Coaching aids such as cones and throw down marker lines.

In the case of wheelchairs, a deposit will be required; for individuals, the amount of deposit required will depend on the wheelchair type requested, clubs will need to raise a deposit of around £250; depending on the type of wheelchair.

### **Dunhill Medical Trust (The) – Deadline: 29th March 2019**

The Dunhill Medical Trust offers two funding schemes for community-based organisations that work directly with older people who need some form of extra support to make everyday living that bit easier:

- [Project Grants](#) cover applications of between £5,000 - £40,000 for time-limited projects that focus on the development of care and support services for older people which are innovative and/or based on evidence of best practice and which can become self-sustaining within a planned period. Priority will be given to services that are focused on older people, enhance existing mainstream services and which are not currently funded by statutory organisations elsewhere in the UK. The Trust will expect the beneficiary organisation to have a robust plan to create the ongoing revenue to maintain the service as the charitable funding diminishes and to have processes in place to ensure minimum disruption to the beneficiaries in implementing these plans. Grants can support up to 36 months work.
- [Building and Infrastructure Grants](#) of between £5,000 and £100,000 are awarded for the provision of accommodation /developments in the built environment for older people to enhance and maintain their health, well-being and independence and/or specific pieces of equipment or furnishings which can be used for the care and support of individuals. Priority will be given to care facilities that are focused specifically on older people and where it has not been possible to obtain the necessary funding from statutory organisations. The beneficiary organisation is required to give a written commitment to bear the revenue costs of the environment and/or equipment, including its maintenance and staffing.

Applications can only be considered from organisations or groups that are charitable as defined by UK charity law. This includes UK registered charities and relevant exempt charities.

The next deadline to apply for both grant streams is 29th March 2019 at 17.00.

### **Edge Fund (The) – Deadline: 24<sup>th</sup> February 2019**

Small community groups tackling discrimination and injustice have until the 24th February 2019 to apply for grants of up to £3,000.

The Edge Fund is a very small fund which was initiated by a small group of philanthropists and activists in early 2012. The Fund supports those taking action for a just, equitable and sustainable world. Grants are awarded to fund work that challenges abuses of power and aims to bring an end to the systems that cause injustice. This could be any system that discriminates against people based on their identity or background (e.g. class, ability, gender, race, nationality, religion, sexuality, age or other factors).

The Edge Fund supports:

- Work that creates long-term change in society by addressing the causes of injustice and inequality.
- Work addressing issues facing a particular community that is led by that community (e.g. a group working on issues around sex work should be led by people with direct lived experience of sex work).

Groups eligible to apply will be non-profit organisations (including groups that are not formally registered) based in the Republic of Ireland, Northern Ireland, Scotland, Wales and England. In particular, the Fund supports small groups that struggle to get funding elsewhere, particularly if other funders might consider them to be too radical. The average income of groups supported is around £2500. Groups with religious purpose are welcome to apply but funding will not be provided for any activity, initiative or project where the primary aim is to promote religion.

### **EnAble Fund for Elected Office – Deadline: See website**

The EnAble Fund for Elected Office is provided by the Government Equalities Office and is administered by Disability Rights UK. The Fund is intended to cover the additional financial costs associated with a disability or health condition, which would otherwise prevent someone from seeking elected office. The overall aim of the Fund is

to create a level playing field for disabled people and people with a long-term health condition - not to give anyone an unfair advantage.

The Fund can cover the cost of the reasonable adjustments required to enable someone to stand for elected office. This could include items such as BSL interpreters, Assistive Technology, a Personal Assistant to assist with specific tasks, or taxi fares where other modes of transport are not appropriate.

The EnAble Fund for Elected Office runs until May 2020 and is therefore primarily intended to support disabled people seeking election in the Local Elections in May 2019 and the Police and Crime Commissioner Elections in May 2020.

Applicants to the Fund must have:

- A physical or mental impairment that has a substantial and long-term adverse effect on their ability to carry out normal day-to-day activities.
- A genuine intention to seek elected office, for an election that takes place during the timescale of the fund. These will include Local Government Elections in May 2019 and Police and Crime Commissioner Elections in May 2020.

### Field Family Trust – Deadline: 14<sup>th</sup> March 2019

Charitable organisations working in the West Midlands and London (within the boundaries of the M25) providing services for young people between the ages of 16 to 25 and the elderly and with an annual income of under £1m can apply to the Field Family Trust for revenue funding. As a small grant making trust, in 2017 the Trustees authorised grants of £19,980 for 8 organisations with the average amount awarded being around £2,300. Grants are usually made for revenue costs such as equipment, furnishings, running costs, helplines, etc. The Trustees do set aside a small amount of their annual income for continuing grants for revenue funding of projects of which they have personal knowledge and fall within their geographical area and criteria.

Applications can be submitted online at any time using the form available on the website. Supporting information may be sent by post or email.

The next meeting of the Trustees will take place in April 2019. **The online application is now [OPEN](#).**

The link to the online application form will be available on this web page until the number of applications received reaches the maximum for this meeting, or until Thursday 14<sup>th</sup> March 2019, whichever is soonest.

The following documents should be uploaded with the application form.

A copy of your most recent **signed** accounts, a budget for the project for the current financial year and, and for applications that are applying for a salary, a job description.

### Field Studies Council – Deadline: 1<sup>st</sup> March 2019

Schools, colleges and youth groups can receive up to 80% towards the costs of providing environmental outreach education for groups of disadvantaged young people through the Field Studies Council's Kids Fund. The Field Studies Council is an independent educational charity committed to raising awareness about the natural world and works through a network of residential and day centres in the UK to provide outreach education and training.

There are two types of Kids Fund course:

**Wildlife and Environment** - focusing on wildlife habitats and the environment with team building activities and **Eco Adventure** - which combines environmental and personally challenging activities.

Groups who meet one of the following criteria will be eligible:

- Disadvantaged young people aged 4-18 years (or up to 25 years for those with special needs).
- Voluntary youth groups (either run by voluntary leaders, managed by a voluntary organisation, a registered charity)

OR

- School groups may apply if they are aiming to provide benefits that are additional to the statutory school curriculum or clearly show added value, depth and breadth to the taught curriculum. FSC Kids Fund will not pay for young people to attend standard curriculum-focused FSC courses.

All applicants must be based in the UK, Isle of Man, Channel Isles and Republic of Ireland.

One free staff/adult place is provided for every 12 young people; additional adults pay 20% +VAT. This includes all equipment, tuition and waterproof hire costs. Food and accommodation are included for residential courses.

The next closing date for applications is the 1st March 2019.

### Henry Smith Charity – Holiday Grants – Deadline: 28<sup>th</sup> February 2019

Schools, youth groups, not for profit organisations and charities have until the 28th February 2019 to apply for grants of £500 to £2,500 to support recreational trips or holidays within the UK between the 1st February and 30th April 2019 for groups of children experiencing disadvantage or who have disabilities. Children need to be aged 13 or under to qualify.

Priority will be given to applications coming from the 20% most deprived areas in the UK. Funded by the Henry Smith Charity, grants can cover up to two-thirds of the cost of a holiday or trip lasting one to seven days. In this round, trips must be taken before the end of April 2019. For more details and to apply, complete the eligibility quiz on the website and submit the application form online at least 6 weeks before the trip is due to take place. Although the deadline is the 30th April 2018, decisions are made on a first come-first served basis until all the funds have been allocated.

Applications must be made at least six weeks before the trip or holiday is due to take place.

### Jean Sainsbury Animal Welfare Trust – Deadline: 1<sup>st</sup> May 2019

The objectives of the Jean Sainsbury Animal Welfare Trust are to donate to UK registered charities whose purposes are to:

- Benefit or protect animals
- Relieve animals from suffering
- Conserve wild life
- Encourage the understanding of animals

Eligible applicant organisations will be a UK registered charity; have independently examined up to date annual accounts and an active re-homing and rehabilitation policy for animals taken into care.

Organisations involved with conservation of wildlife, the rescue, rehabilitation and (where possible) release of animals are also eligible to apply. The funding can be used for general running costs or capital purchases.

Donations usually range from £1,000 to £10,000. Smaller donations may be awarded between the meetings at the discretion of the Chairman and Administrator of the Trust. Larger donations have exceptionally been made.

Repeat applications from charities are encouraged, when further financial support might be given if funds allow.

The next deadline to apply is the 1st May 2019.

### Lady Neville Charity (The) – Deadline: 22<sup>nd</sup> March 2019

Small charities and not for profit organisations working in the areas of local heritage and the performing and visual arts can currently apply for funding through the Lady Neville Charity grants programme.

Eligible organisations can apply for capital grants of up to £1,000 (e.g. equipment, capital building works, etc.).

Trustees may also consider funding towards one-off anniversary events that are not part of core activities. In addition, the Skinners' Company supports any charitable activity that takes place in communities where the Skinners' Company has a presence. These areas are:

- The City of London;
- Camden (particularly Kings Cross);
- Enfield; Hackney;
- Hounslow;
- West Kent (particularly Tonbridge & Malling and Tunbridge Wells).

To be eligible to apply for funding the applicant must be a registered charity or not-for-profit organisation in the UK whose total annual income is less than £100,000, and the total project cost is less than £10,000.

The next closing date for applications is the 22nd March 2019.

### **Leche Trust (The) – Deadline: 26<sup>th</sup> April 2019**

The Leche Trust has announced that the next closing date for applications is the 26th April 2019. The Leche Trust is a grant making charity that provides funding of up to £5,000 to UK registered charities, public authorities or institutions in the areas of the Performing Arts and Conservation.

Through the Performing Arts funding strand, the Trust supports projects that promote excellence in professional performance in music, dance and theatre, with particular emphasis on new work and on the development of young professionals aged 18 or over. Trustees are sympathetic to projects that widen geographical access to the performing arts, for example through festivals and touring.

Through the Conservation funding stream, the Trust will support projects to conserve historic objects, collections and features of buildings and landscapes that date from the Georgian period or earlier, i.e. pre-1830s. Projects may include acquisition costs (for objects) and conservation surveys as well as remedial work.

Trustees are inclined to give grants to smaller projects, or specific elements of projects, where their contribution can make a greater impact. In the case of churches, Trustees will consider supporting the conservation of such features as monuments, wall paintings, stained glass, and historic furniture and fittings.

### **Morrison's Foundation (The) – Deadline – Rolling**

The Morrison's Foundation awards grants to community projects that improve people's lives.

Applicants must demonstrate how the project will deliver public benefit, who in the community will specifically benefit and how it will bring about positive change.

Grants may be applied for by any charity which is registered with the Charity Commission (England and Wales) or the Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator (Scotland) that have financial information dating back to 2012.

Applicants must also have raised some funding towards the project elsewhere.

Projects supported have ranged from support groups to children's hospitals and homeless shelters to hospices across England, Scotland and Wales. In 2018, a total of £9,717,536 was distributed to 807 organisations.

Applications are accepted on a rolling basis can be submitted at any time and there is no specific grant amount that can be applied for.

### **National Churches Trust (The) – Deadline: 9<sup>th</sup> May 2019**

The Gateway Programme supports congregations and local communities to look after and build a sustainable future for their church buildings.

Preference is given to projects from Churches that can demonstrate strong community engagement and sound plans for economic viability. Priority is given to projects that demonstrate support beyond the congregation, and into the future.

Gateway Grant Programme grants can be used for project development and investigative work up to RIBA planning stage 1, to support churches preparing for a major project, and in developing their project to the point at which they can approach a major grant funder.

Grants of between £3,000 and £10,000 for up to 50% of the project costs are available.

Applications are accepted from listed and unlisted Christian places of worship, of any denomination, across the UK. The Trust particularly encourages applications from priority areas i.e. North East England, Northern Ireland and Wales.

The first deadline to apply for a Gateway Grant is the 9th May 2019.

### **Nineveh Charitable Trust – Deadline: Quarterly (see text)**

UK based not for profit organisations and schools can apply for funding to the Nineveh Charitable Trust for a broad range of projects and activities that promote a better understanding of the environment and countryside, whilst facilitating improved access, education and research. Whilst the Trust does not specify a minimum or maximum grant amount that can be applied for, an analysis of previous grants would suggest a maximum of £5,000 per year for up to three years.

Applications are usually discussed at the Trustees' quarterly meetings and applications can be submitted at any time.

### **Pink Ribbon Foundation – Deadline: 31<sup>st</sup> May 2019**

The Pink Ribbon Foundation has announced that it is currently accepting applications to its grant-making programme.

Grants of up to £5,000 are available to UK charities:

Operating income is the normal day to day income of the organisation, such as money received from donations, grants, contracts, investments etc. Exceptional income (such as money received for a major one-off fundraising initiative) can be excluded from the total income. **Grants of over £1,000 for capital costs.**
- **The Small Grants Programme:** decision within 8 weeks.
  - UK registered charities\* with an annual turnover under £250k
  - Projects that cost less than £100k in total
  - Grants of between £500 and £10k for capital costs

A charity which has received a grant in either the Main Grants Programme or the Small Grants Programme cannot apply again for at least five years.

## Funding for Schools

### Ashden Trust – Deadline: rolling

The LESS CO2 sustainable schools programme is a free energy efficiency programme available to any UK school including council run, academy or independent schools.

Funded via the Ashden Trust, the programme consists of a series of half day workshops spread through the year, peer mentoring, expert advice and resources. Through participation in the programme, staff are empowered and equipped to make changes and improvements to their school to reduce their energy usage, save money on bills and lower their CO2 emissions. Schools work together, learning from each other in clusters of 15 schools in a suitable geographical area, attending four local workshops throughout a year. The workshops teach the school's representatives about energy saving in their buildings, how to engage with their fellow staff and students about energy, and educate them about the link between sustainability, energy use and efficiency. So far, 269 schools have benefitted from the scheme with those taking part saving on average £2,600 (and 10 tonnes of carbon) in their first year.

Every school in the UK is eligible to apply by registering an interest on the LESS CO2 website at any time.
