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New in this Edition

Architectural Heritage Fund – Deadline: Rolling

The National Lottery Heritage Fund has announced the launch of its new £ 7 million Heritage Impact Fund. The Heritage Impact Fund is a partnership between the Architectural Heritage Fund, Historic England, Historic Environment Scotland and Rathbone Greenbank Investments.

The fund offers tailored loan finance of between £25,000 and £500,000 for up to three years to charities, social enterprises and community businesses across the UK seeking to acquire, reuse or redevelop buildings of historical or architectural importance.

To apply, applicants must be a formally constituted and incorporated charity, community business or social enterprise whose members have limited liability.

Applicants should in the first instance speak to a member of the AHF's [Investment Team](#) for advice and guidance. If the project is one which the AHF would like to support, applicants will be encouraged to apply and then supported throughout the application process throughout.

Applications can be made at any time.

Asda Foundation – Deadline: Rolling

The Asda Foundation is committed to developing stronger, better connected, sustainable communities across the UK. The Significant Local Community Projects programme allows colleagues to nominate initiatives which will make a real long-term difference, benefiting the wider community and transforming communities to improve lives locally.

Awards are typically made to projects where:

- The charity or good cause has developed a relationship with local the local store or home office at a grassroots level
- The work will tackle the underlying problems in the local community
- Community needs and aspirations are evident in the development of the project
- The project benefits the wider community not just a single user group
- There is a need for this facility locally
- It will make a real long-term difference and will transform the community, improving the lives of those who live there

Grants awarded have previously ranged from £2,600 - £32,000 (in 2017) although no minimum or maximum amounts are published.

Any charity/good cause wishing to apply should first approach their local store or home office to see if their project is something that the Community Champion would be willing to support. Applications can be submitted at any time.

DFID Small Charities Challenge Fund – Deadline: 28th March 2019

The Small Charities Challenge Fund (SCCF) is the first DFID fund designed specifically for small British charities. It provides grants for development organisations with an annual income of £250,000 or less working in priority countries to deliver the Global Goals. Grants of up to £50,000 are available for projects of two years or less.

To date, £2.7million has been committed to 55 small charities delivering a diverse range of projects. These include providing prosthetic limbs to amputees in the Gambia; supporting landless youth to start bee-keeping businesses in Ethiopia and transforming the lives of carers in Bangladesh.

The closing date for the next review of applications is **Thursday 28 March 2019**.

DM Thomas Foundation – Deadline: 7th May 2019

The next deadline to apply to the DM Thomas Foundation Central Grants Programme is the 7th May 2019. The Foundation distributes a total of around £200,000 per quarter.

Grants of up to £30,000 are available per year for up to two years to registered charities for projects that improve education and health for young people in three key areas:

- Children and young people with disabilities
- Children and young people who are sick in hospital
- Children and young people who are life limited (requiring palliative care)

The Foundation is a small charity and generally will not make awards of over £30,000 (per year). Funding can be requested for one-off projects or for up to 2 years work.

Applications from schools and hospitals are welcomed as long as they are made through an appropriate registered charity.

If favored, grant applications for up to £5,000 can be approved by the Director, up to £10,000 can be approved by the Grants Committee, and applications for more than £10,000 are recommended to the Trustees for final approval.

D'Oyly Carte Charitable Trust – Deadline: 18th June 2019

The Trust gives grants to registered charities in the United Kingdom in support of causes connected with the arts, medical welfare and the environment.

Grants generally range from £500 to £5,000 for one-year periods, however longer-term grants are sometimes awarded.

The Trustees will consider applications for core costs or projects, and they also consider applications for matched funding. Projects falling into the following themes will be considered:

- Bursaries for arts education establishments
- Promotion of access, education and excellence in the arts
- Hospice care
- Autism, the deafblind, respite care and care for carers
- Preservation of the countryside and heritage conservation.

The Trustees usually consider applications three times a year in March, July and November.

The next deadline to apply is the 18th June 2019.

Drapers' Charitable Fund – Deadline: Rolling

The Drapers' Company supports registered charities with projects that aim to improve the quality of life and expectations of people and their communities within the UK, particularly those disadvantaged or socially excluded. Most of the support is focused in Greater London and covers the following areas:

- Social Welfare - including homelessness, prisoners, ex-service personnel, support for the elderly, carers, community and family services, disabled adults;
- Education and Training - projects which raise the aspirations or help to realise the full potential of disadvantaged young people under 25 years old;
- Textiles and Heritage - including textile conservation, projects within the textile industry, museums, memorials and monuments relating to the armed forces, history of London or the textile trade.

There is no minimum or maximum grant; grants are normally awarded for sums up to £15,000.

Applications can be submitted at any time of the year. Applications are considered at meetings in November, February and June.

Finnis Scott Foundation – Deadline: 7th June 2019

Established under the Will of Lady Montagu Douglas Scott (Valerie Finnis) in 2006, the Finnis Scott Foundation makes grants for any charitable purpose, but their present policy is to focus grant-making in the areas of horticulture and plant sciences, as well as fine art and art history.

Grants of between £500 and £10,000 are available. Exceptionally, larger grants may be considered at the Trustees' discretion. Preference is given to making grants to smaller charities where the grant would have a significant impact. The Foundation funds both capital and revenue projects.

The Trustees meet on a quarterly basis; the next meeting is on the 3rd July 2019. Apply by the 7th June 2019 for this meeting.

Football Foundation – Deadline: Rolling

The Football Foundation's Premier League & the FA Facilities Fund is open for applications.

The Premier League & the FA Facilities Fund, which is available to football clubs, schools, councils and local sports associations, is focused on supporting the development of new or refurbished local football facilities, and replaces the previous Facilities Scheme, Build the Game and the Premier League Community Facility Fund.

The Premier League & the FA Facilities Fund gives grants of between £10,000 and £500,000 for projects that:

- Improve facilities for football and other sport in local communities
- Sustain or increase participation amongst children and adults, regardless of background age, or ability
- Help children and adults to develop their physical, mental, social and moral capacities through regular participation in sport.

The types of facilities the Football Foundation give money for include:

- Grass pitches drainage/improvements
- Pavilions, clubhouses and changing rooms
- 3G Football Turf Pitches (FTPs) and multi-use games areas
- Fixed floodlights for artificial pitches.

Priority for applications involving professional club community programmes will be given to projects that are located within areas of high deprivation (as defined by the Governments Indices of Deprivation). For projects outside of these areas, priority will be given to those that can demonstrate that it draws a significant proportion of its participants from neighbouring deprived areas.

Schemes that are a joint application between professional club community schemes and grassroots football will be prioritised, as will those supporting 3G FTPs. Applicants must be able to demonstrate that all available options for match funding have been exhausted and to be able to provide evidence for this. As a guide, projects would normally be expected to secure 50% match funding although each project will be assessed based on individual circumstances. The Football Foundation strongly recommends that applicants use the pre-application advice offered on their behalf by The FA and the network of County FAs around England.

Future Parks Accelerator – Deadline: see website

A new £10million 'Future Parks Accelerator' initiative is a new national initiative to enable places across the UK to develop ambitious solutions to secure and enhance the future of public parks and greenspaces for long term public benefit.

Heritage Fund have joined forces with the National Trust to find and back ambitious and sustainable solutions to protect and enhance public parks and green spaces. The Future Parks Accelerator (FPA) is a UK-wide £10m strategic initiative that will enable up to eight local authorities and communities to develop and implement bold and innovative funding and management solutions for all their green spaces across, against a challenging backdrop of financial uncertainty.

The FPA will support places to grow the contribution parks make to civic life while becoming financially sustainable. It will involve discovering how parks and green spaces could be better used, managed and funded to serve community needs and aspirations now and over the next generation.

Grants of up to £5million will support projects to regenerate public parks, urban green spaces and cemeteries through HLFs open programmes.

Grow Wild – Deadline: 1st April 2019

Young People aged 14 – 25 have the opportunity to apply for grants of up to £500 for projects that celebrates UK native wildflowers and fungi in exciting and engaging ways. To be eligible for funding young people need to find a supporting organisation such as a school (excluding primary schools), university, youth club or a local community group.

To apply young people will need to follow the following steps:

- Step 1: Come up with your great project idea!
- Step 2: Find a [Supporting Organisation](#) to help you deliver the project
- Step 3: Make a [short video application](#) on your phone and upload it securely
- Step 4: [Complete our online form](#), including a link to your video

To celebrate UK's native wildflowers and fungi; projects could use the mediums of:

- Arts / Design / Film / Theatre / Dance / Data

The list is not exhaustive.

The funding is being made available through Grow Wild and the closing date for applications is midday on the 1st April 2019.

Hilden Charitable Fund – Deadline: 15th May 2019

The Hilden Charitable Fund awards grants of an average of £5,000 to causes working at community level in the UK and developing countries which are less likely to be able to raise funds from public subscriptions.

Current UK funding priorities are: Homelessness, Penal Affairs, Asylum Seekers and Refugees, and Community Based initiatives for Disadvantaged Young People Aged 16 to 25 (to fund programmes that are helping these young people in the job market, with advice, training, volunteering and work placement schemes).

Overseas, Hilden concentrates on projects in developing countries working on community development, education, and health and particularly welcomes those that address the needs and potential of girls and women.

Only applications submitted on the form supplied on the website will be considered.

Hilden accepts applications at any time but the closing date for the Summer meeting is Wednesday May 15th 2019.

John Spedan Lewis Foundation – Deadline: 3rd May 2019

The John Spedan Lewis Foundation (JSLF) provides finance for charitable purposes reflecting the interests of John Spedan Lewis- notably entomology, ornithology, horticulture and associated environmental and conservation projects.

JSLF Trustees meet bi-annually to consider funding appeals and generally awards grants to small and medium sized projects. In 2018, 13 donations totalling £74,885 were made to 13 charities.

UK registered charities for which natural history topics are explicitly stated among their charitable purposes, including wildlife conservation, entomology, ornithology and horticulture are eligible to apply.

The Foundation also sponsors a doctoral studentship every three to four years.

Leeds Building Society – Deadline: 13th May 2019

Leeds Building Society Foundation primarily provides funding towards practical items that directly support those in need including those with disabilities, affected by homelessness, or with serious health issues.

Donations usually fund items of "capital expenditure" i.e. items must directly help those in need, rather than contributing to the charity's running costs.

The Foundation accepts applications from UK registered charities, or those affiliated with a registered charity. Applications are reviewed every quarter. The deadline for the next (June) meeting is Monday 13th May 2019.

Lloyds Banking Group – Deadline: 27th March 2019

Lloyds Banking Group is inviting applications to its Social Entrepreneurs Programme - a package of support to social enterprises that includes a learning programme, business mentoring and a grant. The programme is aimed at both start up social enterprises and existing social enterprises that want to trade up or scale up. The programme has three levels of support:

Start Up is aimed at people in need or improving the environment who are in the early stages of setting up a social enterprise, charity or impact project and need some support to get things up-and-running. The programme could provide:

- A free learning programme (14 learning days, spread over a year)
- A grant of £1,000 (money you don't pay back)
- A support network
- Mentoring

Trade Up is aimed at social enterprises that have been running for at least a year and making at least £15,000 a year (total income, including trading, grant and donations). The programme could provide:

- Free learning programme (14 learning days spread over a year)
- Match Trading grant of up to £4,000
- Support network
- Mentoring

Scale Up is aimed at social enterprises ready to significantly scale up e.g. through social franchising, increasing geographical reach, or making a step change in impact by developing new markets or partnerships. The social enterprise, charity or impact project will have been running for at least two years and will be making at least £75,000 a year (total income, including trading, grant and donations). The programme could provide:

- Free learning programme (14 days spread over a year)
- Match Trading grant of up to £7,000
- Support network
- Mentoring

Applications are welcome from people from all backgrounds, including long-term unemployed, ex-offenders, and people with disabilities.

The deadline for applications to the programme is Wednesday 27th March 2019, at 12pm.

Lord's Taverners – Accessible Minibuses – Deadline: Rolling

The Lord's Taverners, the UK's leading youth cricket and disability sports charity, has re-opened its Accessible Minibuses grants programme. Schools, clubs and youth organisations across the UK that cater for young people under the age of 25 who have a physical/ sensory/ learning disability can apply to the Lords Taverners for specially-adapted, wheelchair-accessible minibuses.

Last year the Lords Taverners delivered 40 specially-adapted, wheelchair-accessible minibuses.

These vehicles give young people with disabilities access to new places and experiences. Lord's Taverners minibuses are based on the current Ford Transit model, with a diesel engine. The average cost to the charity of an accessible minibus is over £61,000. Please note that the Lord's Taverners are unable to support schools that cater for socially disadvantaged children, or mainstream schools for children with behavioural problems.

Applications to the programme can be submitted at any time and are reviewed at the end of each quarter.

Masonic Charitable Foundation – Disadvantaged and Vulnerable Older People – Deadline: 31st May 2019

Local and national charities in England and Wales can apply to the Later Life Inclusions grants programme run by the Masonic Charitable Foundation. The Later Life Inclusion grants programme is open to charities working to reduce loneliness and isolation of vulnerable and disadvantaged people over 50.

Grants can be offered to charities that provide:

- Mental and physical health support
- Gateway and access to service, e.g. transport and technology
- Community based approaches, i.e. volunteering, positive ageing and neighbourhood support
- Advocacy, social and welfare support

The type of activities that could be funded include:

- Support for emotional and psychological planning for later life
- Digital inclusion sessions to enable older people to access services
- Activities and clubs enabling older people to remain active and make friends
- Providing companionship and befriending schemes for periods of transition
- Advice and information on options for those with health conditions
- Carers and respite support

The programme offers both small grants of up to £15,000 to charities with an annual income of up to £500,000 for projects lasting up to three years; and grants of between £10,000 and £150,000 to charities with an annual income of above £500,000 for projects lasting up to three years.

The next closing date for the small grants programme is 4pm on the 31st May 2019 and 5pm on the 15th April 2019 to the large grants programme (Stage 1 applications).

Masonic Charitable Foundation – Early Years Opportunities – Deadline: 31st May 2019

Charities in England and Wales can apply for Early Years Opportunities Grants through the Masonic Charitable Foundation. The Early Years Opportunities programme is open to charities that help disadvantaged children and young people (up to the age of 25 years) overcome the barriers they face to achieve the best possible start in life.

Grants can be offered to charities that provide:

- Mental and physical health support
- Learning and development, including language and communication skills, social and emotional etc.
- Parental support, including whole family approach
- Pastoral and advocacy support

The type of activities that could be funded include:

- Additional educational opportunities such as improving literacy and numeracy
- Individual interventions, i.e. parent education, home visiting or mentoring
- Encouraging healthy behaviours with regards to diet, activity and wellbeing
- Psychological interventions for domestic abuse and behavioural issues etc.
- Provision of vital adaptive technologies and equipment removing barriers
- Alternative methods or specialist therapies to help children and young people integrate into the mainstream education system.

The programme offers both small grants of up to £15,000 to charities with an annual income of up to £500,000 for projects lasting up to three years; and grants of between £10,000 and £150,000 to charities with an annual income of above £500,000 for projects lasting up to three years.

The next closing date for the small grants programme is 4pm on the 31st May 2019 and 5pm on the 15th April 2019 to the large grants programme (Stage 1 applications).

Ministry of Defence: Armed Forces Day – Deadline: 30th April 2019

The Ministry of Defence (MoD) is offering funding for community celebration events and activities taking place on or around Saturday 29th June 2019 - Armed Forces Day 2019. Grants of up to £10,000 to cover up to 50% of the costs involved in running an event may be awarded.

Local councils, community organisations, schools, ex-service organisations and individuals in the UK are eligible to apply for events that:

- Are held on or within the weeks around Saturday 29th June 2019
- Have 'Armed Forces' in the event title
- Are relevant to today's serving Armed Forces
- Have free access to members of the 'Armed Forces Family' – Serving personnel, Veterans, Cadets and their Families (though charges may be made for parking, programs etc.)
- Are not centered around Fundraising or Recruitment

The Armed Forces Day website provides ideas, inspiration and resources including posters and decoration ideas; there is a dedicated resource page for schools that includes assembly kits.

The deadline for submitting applications is Monday 30th April 2019. Event organisers should in the first instance register their event on the Armed Forces Day website.

PRS Foundation – Deadline: 10th June 2019

PRS Foundation's Open Fund for Organisations supports high quality new music projects led by promoters, talent development organisations, venues, festivals, curators and large performance groups (for example orchestras, choirs, jazz bands or folk groups with 12 or more performers).

Supported projects will involve the creation, performance and promotion of new music and enable Music Creators i.e. songwriters, composers, or solo artists, bands, producers and performers of all backgrounds, to develop creatively and professionally.

Grants of up to £10,000 are awarded to composers cover activities such as:

- Touring
- Recording
- Promotion and marketing
- Commissions of new music by UK-based creators*
- Exciting community projects involving high-quality music creators
- Music creator residencies
- Live programmes featuring new UK music

Successful proposals will fit all three of the following funding priorities:

- To support the creation, performance and promotion of outstanding new music in any genre
- To enable the UK's most talented music creators to realise their potential
- To inspire audiences

Priority is given to not for profit groups.

The next closing date for applications is 6pm on the 10th June 2019.

Sandwell MBC – Sports Grants – Deadline: 17th May 2019

Sports clubs and gifted local athletes can once again apply for special grants from Sandwell Council as part of its Cash for Sports Clubs or Gifted and Talented grant schemes.

The council has launched the fourth round of the Cash for Sports Clubs scheme, which was first launched in 2014 to give cash grants to sports clubs in the borough.

The council is also offering new grants to keen young people under its Gifted and Talented programme, which has helped many keen athletes to improve.

More than £70,000 has been handed out over the years to about 70 sports clubs, helping to fund new kits and equipment as well as coaching courses and improving the quality of sessions.

Clubs can apply for funding of up to £500 to help with kits and equipment and up to £1,500 to help grow membership and increase the number of Sandwell residents being active. There's also funding available for specialist coaching.

The scheme opens on Monday 11 March and closes on Friday 17 May at 5pm.

Councillor Gavan said that cash was also available for gifted young elite athletes to fund improvements to equipment and offer support.

Applicants can apply for grants up to £500 a year by applying on the Sandwell council website at www.sandwell.gov.uk/giftedandtalented. Applications are assessed by a small awards panel.

Swimathon Foundation – Deadline: 3rd April 2019

The Swimathon Foundation has announced that its Community Grants Scheme has opened for applications. The Swimathon Foundation Community Grants Scheme offers funding of between £500 and £2,500 to groups who provide and promote swimming in their local community; in particular to groups that would otherwise not take part. Grants are available towards:

- Providing swimming lessons targeted at a specific group or section of society that would not be able to take part, or would have extreme difficulty in participating in mainstream swimming lessons
- The costs of staging an activity at a pool which aims to introduce non-swimmers or lapsed swimmers or very occasional swimmers to an enjoyable pool experience that is designed to stimulate and support their continued participation
- A grant towards equipment or improvements at a pool which will encourage either increased participation, for example through improving access above and beyond that required in the Equality Act 2010, or that will help swimming development in novice or non-swimmers. For example:
- Encouraging swimming participation from groups that may have a health need and can gain particular benefit.
- Encouraging under 5's, children and young people, adults and older people to understand the benefits of taking part in healthy physical aquatic activity as part of the Start Active – Stay Active guidelines from the Chief Medical Officers in the UK
- Raising awareness, particularly in children, of water safety good practice and survival skills and techniques
- A grant to aid swimming clubs to develop programmes that are outside the normal delivery, providing a unique opportunity in swimming development

To be eligible for a Swimathon grant organisations need to be supported by pools that are participating in Swimathon. Some of examples of groups that Swimathon Foundation Community grants will support, but are not limited to:

- Community groups
- Swimming clubs
- Senior groups
- Youth groups
- Sports clubs
- Disability charities
- Scout groups
- Healthy living groups; etc.

Applicants must be a representative of, or have the support of, a pool participating in Swimathon.

The closing date for applications is the 3rd April 2019.

Tesco Bags of Help Centenary Grants – Deadline: see website

Not for profit organisations including registered charities, community interest companies, health bodies, NHS Hospital Trusts, Foundation Trusts), local authorities and social housing providers (the list is not exhaustive) can apply for funding for projects that have a significant community benefit within individual Tesco regions.

The funding is being made available through the Tesco Bags of Help Centenary Grants. The types of projects funded will be very broad and will cover the direct costs needed to deliver the project, this could range from:

- Improvements to a building of regional or national significance that benefits the whole community such as a museum, hospice, specialist hospital ward, art gallery, heritage centre, wildlife centre or an ancient monument.
- Improvements to an outdoor space of regional or national significance such as walking/cycling routes, gardens, nature reserves, wildlife areas, waterways or woodlands.
- Delivering activities or charitable services across a whole region such as health and wellbeing support activities, foodbanks, community clubs, homelessness support, sporting activities, recycling/upcycling programmes, regional school focused programmes and community festivals or events.
- Providing equipment that will benefit the whole region such as medical equipment, minibuses, mobile libraries and safety equipment.

There will be two voting rounds during 2019. Three community projects in each region will be voted on by customers in Tesco stores throughout the UK, in July/August and November/December 2019. Sport England has launched its new capital fund, the Community Asset Fund, in support of its new strategy 'Towards an Active Nation'.

Community organisations, clubs, statutory bodies and educational establishments can apply for investments of up to £150,000 for projects which create or improve opportunities to play sport and get active in local communities.

Grants do not have to be used for a traditional space or traditional sport. Examples of eligible project locations include: canal towpaths, woodlands and open spaces with the potential to be used and enjoyed as part of an active lifestyle.

There are three levels of grant investment:

- **Small Scale Investments** (£1,000 and £15,000) – to cover the cost of emergency works due to something like storm or flood damage, or something totally unexpected that is stopping people from being able to stay active right now.
- **Medium Scale Investments** (£15,000 and 50,000) – to make more substantial changes. This might be an upgrade to an existing facility or developing a new space in the community.
- **Large Scale Investments** (£50,000 and £150,000) – for projects which can demonstrate a considerable impact or are targeting under-represented groups.

The LESS CO2 sustainable schools programme is a free energy efficiency programme available to any UK school including council run, academy or independent schools.

Funded via the Ashden Trust, the programme consists of a series of half day workshops spread through the year, peer mentoring, expert advice and resources. Through participation in the programme, staff are empowered and equipped to make changes and improvements to their school to reduce their energy usage, save money on bills and lower their CO2 emissions. Schools work together, learning from each other in clusters of 15 schools in a suitable geographical area, attending four local workshops throughout a year. The workshops teach the school's representatives about energy saving in their buildings, how to engage with their fellow staff and students about energy, and educate them about the link between sustainability, energy use and efficiency. So far, 269 schools have benefitted from the scheme with those taking part saving on average £2,600 (and 10 tonnes of carbon) in their first year.
